PLEASE NOTE THAT CHILDREN MUST BE ACCOMPANIED BY AN ADULT (18+) WHILE ATTENDING THE COMPETITIONS AND WILL REMAIN THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THEIR CARER/TEACHER THROUGHOUT

Who can enter?

- Children in school years Reception to Year 8 entry is free.
- Performers in Year 9 and above are encouraged to enter the novice categories of the <u>adult competitions</u> where they will receive a very warm welcome.
- Players and performers younger than Year 9 may also enter the novice adult comps if that seems more appropriate to their standard of playing.
- You can enter no matter where you live and whatever your standard of playing
- You can enter as a soloist, a duo or group, or ask a teacher to enter your school choir.

How do I enter?

Step 1 - Fill in an entry form for each category you would like to enter.

- This year we ask that you register in advance by the 29th June!
- Click on the relevant entry form in the table below.
- Performers can enter more than one category.
- Consider getting together with a friend or two and entering as a duo or group, or asking your teacher to enter your school choir.
- You can edit or withdraw your entry later on please let us know if you can no longer make it so we can open your space to someone else.
- There may be spaces for on-the-day sign ups in some categories but we have been very busy in recent years and this cannot be guaranteed! **Please pre-register!**
- Please read the <u>detailed entry guidelines</u> for more information about each category.

- The schedule above is subject to change depending on the number of entries.
- Start times for each category will be finalised and communicated to registered
 entrants at the beginning of July, after registration closes, as well as more widely

Step 2 - Choose a performance piece

- Rothbury Traditional Music Festival exists to celebrate and promote traditional music, song and poetry and we therefore encourage entries of a **traditional tune or song** in the musical categories *it does not have to be Northumbrian!*
- Most music teachers teach at least one traditional piece as part of their syllabus or check out the <u>Traditional Music Library</u> for free sheet music and other resources.
- In the poetry category, either recite your own Northumbrian dialect poem or one by another author - have a look at this <u>Northumbrian word list</u> for ideas or these <u>poems</u> by local authors - you do not have to be Northumbrian to enter!
- Remember to read the detailed <u>entry guidelines</u> for each category before making your choice.
- ALL PERFORMANCES SHOULD LAST 3 MINUTES OR LESS!

Step 3 - Practise, Practise, Practise!

- With your teacher or carer's help (or completely on your own!), learn and practise performing your tune, song or poem in front of a friendly audience.
- Practise introducing your performance to the judge and audience say your name and the name of the tune, song or poem you are going to perform.

Step 4 - Come to Rothbury Music Festival on Saturday 13th July 2024

- Turn up bright and early with your family, friends & fans on **Saturday 13th July 2024** at the **United Reformed Church** in the centre of Rothbury, behind the outdoor stage.
- Start times for each category will be finalised and communicated to registered entrants at the beginning of July, after registration closes, as well as more widely published via <u>social media</u> and the <u>festival website</u>.
- The venue will be open from 9am for enquiries and late sign-ups (*if* spaces are available).

Step 5 - Perform

- Remember the maximum performance length is 3 minutes!
- There will be an **electric piano in the venue** for performers or accompanists to use.
- The judge will love it if you introduce yourself first and name the tune/song/poem you will be performing for them.
- Don't forget to smile and look like you're having fun it makes the music or poem sound even better!

What else is there to do at the festival?

We recommend you set aside the whole day and have a family day out at the festival! See the <u>festival website</u> for more details - there are many free and low cost events:

- Pipe band parade at 12:30 on Saturday
- Free outdoor stage with performances starting at approx. 13:00 on Saturday
- A storyteller and facepainter roaming the village on Saturday
- Free entry for children to the acoustic concert in All Saints at 6:30 pm on Saturday
- Free Final Fling Ceilidh in the Jubilee Hall from 11am on Sunday morning no ticket required and refreshments available to purchase.

Tickets for the <u>festival concerts</u> are available to buy online or from Tully's on Rothbury High Street.

Children's Competition Categories & Detailed Guidelines

All performances should be no longer than 3 minutes!

- Children are welcome to enter more than one category of the competitions and may perform in more than one duo or group.
- Children may not, however, enter more than one performance into any one solo category.
- All categories except for Northumbrian Dialect Poetry are usually split into two age groups, according to school year (years Reception to 4 and Years 5-8).
- The competition organisers reserve the right to amalgamate age groups and categories at their discretion if entry numbers are low.
- We encourage performers and their families to watch as many of the competitions as possible and cheer each other on as space in the venue allows.
- No movement will be allowed in and out of the performance room during performances themselves but we will have regular breaks in between categories and there is a comfortable foyer at the venue with glass-walled views onto the performance area.
- For each category, performers will take the stage in the order we received their entry form and will perform in front of an experienced judge and an audience of other performers, their friends/families and potentially other festival-goers too - the competitions are open to all to watch.
- Our experienced judges will watch all the performances, provide verbal feedback and announce the winners on the day.
- All entrants will receive a reward for entering the competitions and there are additional prizes for winners and placed performers.

- There will be an electric piano and music stands available at the venue for performers/accompanists to use.

Competition Categories

School Choirs

- 'First Schools' (Years Reception to 4)
- 'Middle (& Primary) Schools' (Years 5 to 8)
- Performances should be no longer than 3 minutes!
- School choirs should be entered by a teacher and it is the responsibility of that teacher/school to put in place appropriate procedures for the care and behaviour of the children while at the competitions, including whether responsibility is delegated to parents or not.
- Primary school choirs are very welcome to enter and will be entered in the Middle School category
- In the event that very few choirs enter the competition, and at the competition organisers' discretion, age group categories may be amalgamated or choirs may instead be entered into the Duos & Groups category.

Solo Singing Categories

- School Years Reception to Year 4
- School Years 5 8
- Performances should be no longer than 3 minutes!
- May be unaccompanied or accompanied on any instrument by an adult or by a child in school year 9 or above
- Where an accompanist is in school year 8 or below, then the entry would count as a duo/group performance, not a solo please enter the duo/group category in this case
- Electric piano available at venue.

Duos & Groups (Any Combination of Vocal and/or Instrumental)

- School Years Reception to Year 4
- School Years 5 8
- Performances should be no longer than 3 minutes!
- As a general principle, the age of the oldest member determines the entry category but the final decision is at the competition organisers' discretion - please enter the school year of all performers on your entry form.

- Electric piano available at venue
- There are separate competition categories for school choirs.

Solo Instrument: Piano or Keyboard

- School Years Reception to Year 4
- School Years 5 8
- Performances should be **no longer than 3 minutes**!
- Electric piano available at venue.
- The competition organisers reserve the right to amalgamate Solo Instrument categories in either or both age groups if there are low numbers of entrants.

Solo Instrument: Fiddle/Violin/Viola

- School Years Reception to Year 4
- School Years 5 8
- Performances should be no longer than 3 minutes!
- May be unaccompanied or accompanied on any instrument by an adult or by a child in school year 9 or above
- Where the accompanist is in school year 8 or below, then the entry would count as a duo/group performance, not a solo please enter the duo/group category in this case
- Electric piano available at venue.
- The competition organisers reserve the right to amalgamate Solo Instrument categories in either or both age groups if there are low numbers of entrants.

Solo Instrument: Miscellaneous

- School Years Reception to Year 4
- School Years 5 8
- Performances should be no longer than 3 minutes!
- May be unaccompanied or accompanied on any instrument by an adult or by a child in school year 9 or above
- Where the accompanist is in school year 8 or below, then the entry would count as a duo/group performance, not a solo please enter the duo/group category in this case
- Electric piano available at venue.
- The competition organisers reserve the right to amalgamate Solo Instrument categories in either or both age groups if there are low numbers of entrants.

Northumbrian Dialect Poetry

- School Years: Reception Year 8
- Performances should be **no longer than 3 minutes**!
- Performers may recite their own work or that of another Northumbrian dialect poet, if they have sought the appropriate permission to do so
- Please see below for a list of poems for which we have arranged prior permission for performance by any entrant to the children's competitions
- Please state whether the performer is reciting their own poem on the entry form and/or prior to performance.

Suggested Poems for Northumbrian Dialect Poetry Category

You could write your own dialect poem to recite - there is a <u>list of Northumbrian words</u> and other resources available at the <u>Northumbrian Language Society</u>.

Or you could **perform one of the poems below, kindly supplied by local poets <u>James Tait</u> and <u>Andrew Charleton</u>, or seek permission to recite a ddialect poem by another author.**
